Checking Your Assumptions About Church Membership and Growth

The following article is written by one of my Doctor of Ministry professors, Dr. Lovett H. Weems, Jr. of Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington D.C. in an edition of Leading Ideas.

Peter Drucker, a writer, management consultant, and self-described "social ecologist," maintains that most organizational problems are not the result of groups doing things poorly but rather because the assumptions on which the organization was built, and on which it still runs, no longer fit reality. Could our congregations be taking for granted some things that were safe assumptions in the past, but no longer fit? I listed common assumptions in church life that may require rethinking.

- If new people are really interested, they will join the church. Many people today participate actively in church without joining. Some may never join.
- New people will attend worship first, some will then join a class, and eventually some will participate in mission.
 The sequence today may be just the opposite, especially for the young. Serving may be their entry followed by a small group and then worship.
- Visitors / Guest will check out our doctrines and then decide to stay or go. Beliefs and values are important and should be clear, but decisions about choosing a church are based far more on relationship and belonging. People are more interested in what you believe once they feel they belong.
- Most new members will come from our denomination. There was a time when newcomers would find the nearest church of their denomination to attend. Denomination matters much less today while a church's vision, ministries, and relationships count for far more.
- Guests will want to be recognized. Some may, but many do not. There are multiple ways to show hospitality without public recognition.
- People will attend a church near their home. The distance people travel to church is getting greater. One example is that 25 percent of Roman Catholics who attend church go to a church outside their geographical parish.
- We know our community well. Make sure you do because the longer a church is in existence, the less connected it tends to be to community changes. A new congregation, however, is likely to know the pulse of the community well.


